The Feast of the Annunciation is the reason why we celebrate Christmas on December 25. Christmas comes exactly nine months after the Archangel Gabriel invited the Virgin Mary to be the Mother of God, an event we commemorate on March 25.



The dating of these Feast Days, although interesting, is of minor importance compared to their theological significance. It is fruitful to reflect upon the incarnation of Jesus Christ in the womb of the Virgin Mary as the antecedent to the explosion of joy, caroling, gift giving, eating, drinking, love and family unity that surrounds the birth of the Savior. Perhaps Mary had a sort of private and internal Christmas at the moment of the Annunciation. Maybe she felt the fullness of the world's Christmas joy inside of her own heart when she realized she had been chosen to be the Mother of God.

Prayers in Honor of the Seven Sorrows and Seven Joys of Saint Joseph

Origin of this devotion: Two Franciscan friars were sailing along the coast of Flanders when a terrible storm arose which sank the boat along with its three hundred passengers. The two Friars, however, had held on to a wooden plank for three days and nights while continually praying to Saint Joseph. Saint Joseph did appear to them as a young man and he helped them to safety. He then told them to daily recite the Our Father and Hail Mary seven times in memory of his seven sorrows and seven joys. The prayers below were composed by Ven. Januarius Sarnelli, C.S.S.R. (d. 1744) and can be used to keep this devotion. It can be prayed for seven Sundays in a row, seven days in a row or all at once. For those who wish to pray this prayer daily, the following structure on one possible approach:

First Sorrow/Joy: Sundays Second Sorrow/Joy: Wondays Third Sorrow/Joy: Tuesdays Fourth Sorrow/Joy: Wednesdays Fifth Sorrow/Joy: Thursdays Sixth Sorrow/Joy: Friday Seventh Sorrow/Joy: Saturday

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Growing in Grace by Fr. Thomas J. Connery

An orphan boy was living in Paris at the end of world war II. All alone, he had to scrounge around the city as best he could to find food, clothes and shelter. Most everyone was experiencing desperation.

Years before, he had heard someone talk about God and even Jesus. But with the hell on earth that the war had brought into his life, he had long since lost what little faith he had. One cold morning, he stopped outside the window of a small bakery. His stomach ached from the smell of the fresh bread. He was so absorbed in the moment outside the bakery window that he didn't realize an American soldier had come up and was watching him. He hardly noticed it when the G.I. walked past him into the store. He did, however, notice the large bag the baker was filling for the G.I. with rolls, breads and pastries. And the boy could hardly breathe when the soldier exited the shop, knelt down and handed him the bag. He looked at the G.I. with astonishment and gratefulness. Finally, he asked the question that was running through his mind: "Mister, are you Jesus

People today still long to see Jesus We are to be Jesus to others. As St. Teresa of Calcutta counseled: do small acts of kindness with great love. This is what the world waits to see. We will show them Jesus by our love.

Father, I want to show your Son to the world by my example. When I live like your Son, they will know that God is with us. I may not do anything extraordinary, but I can do little acts of kindness. This Lent may I show others your Son, Jesus. Amen
