Fr Liborio's Reflection

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Today's Gospel tells the story of Jesus' righteous anger to those who are using His Father's house into a marketplace.

Righteous anger and the necessary actions that follow from it are not in any way sinful. We hear "Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, 'take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!"

We too can experience 'righteous anger' when we see and hear injustice – this is often directed at our poor and innocent brothers and sisters. At times we need to find our 'righteous anger' within us so that we can speak and stand up for those who are unable to do so. As a result of doing this, also brings up the possibility that others will retaliate against us. But we should not be afraid; we have the Lord on our side.





Pope's prayer intention for March: The sacrament of reconciliation

Pope Francis' prayer intention for March seeks to highlight the joy that the Sacrament of Reconciliation brings, and reminds us that it's a loving and merciful encounter between us and God.

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Receiving this Sacrament isn't a matter of standing before a judge, but of going to a loving encounter with a Father who receives us and always forgives us.

When I go to confession, it is in order to be healed, to heal my soul. To leave with greater spiritual health. To pass from misery to mercy.

The center of confession is not the sins we declare, but the divine love we receive, of which we are always in need.

The center of confession is Jesus who waits for us, who listens to us and forgives us. Remember this: In the heart of God, we come before our mistakes.

And let us pray that we may experience the sacrament of reconciliation with renewed depth, to taste the forgiveness and infinite mercy of God. And let us pray that God may give his Church merciful priests and not torturers.

St. Frances of Rome - Patron Saint of widows and motorists

Today's saint, born into a wealthy noble family in the Eternal City, was married to a man from a similarly privileged family when she was just thirteen. Saint Frances earnestly sought to do the will of God in serving her husband, her children, and her home while also attempting to live a high level of holiness modeled on the life of a nun. She had desired to enter religious life from a young age, but her father refused to break his promise to give Frances in marriage to a fellow nobleman. Frances struggled with an internal conflict between her married state and the religious state to which she had originally felt called. This was not a choice between a good and a bad option. It was a natural tension in the soul of a holy woman who saw two paths open before her, both of which led to God. After her husband died and her children were grown, Saint Frances did live the ordered life of a religious, albeit outside of a convent.

Her sterling example of piety and service led her to found a group of like-minded women who lived in the world but who bound themselves to a life of prayer and service. The group was later recognized as an order in the Church under the title the Oblates of Saint Frances of Rome.

Saint Frances of Rome, through your intercession, aid all wives and mothers to live lives of generous service to their families. Help them to serve the domestic Church by creating, and fortifying, that cradle of holiness and culture the Church so needs to flourish.





7 Keys to Men's Confessions

The Jeff Cavins Show (according to Matthew James Christoff)

Ask yourself these questions before entering the confessional, based on seven attacks Satan makes on the family:

- 1. Satan searches to disrupt the union between man and woman: "Is my unity with my bride in Christ strong, and getting stronger?"
- 2. Satan attacks in a way to create chaos: "Have I established and maintained strong paternal authority, order, and a Catholic culture in my family?" 3. And more...

Lenten Activity: What's with the Pretzels?

Explain that, because we are called to pray and fast during Lent, the pretzel has come to be seen as a Lenten food, because it reminds us of the prayer posture of early Christians and it is a

simple food that we can eat in place of a meal.

Tell the children that, according to tradition, an Italianmonk in the early 600s invented the pretzel as a reminder to his brother monks to pray during the season of Lent. He named his creation "little arms," which in Latin is bracellae. From this word came the German word bretzel (eventually pretzel).




Growing in Grace by Fr. Thomas J. Connery
